



Daily Activities

If you wish to make up additional tasks of your own, bonus points will again be rewarded.

<p><u>Ladybird's spots matching game</u> https://www.topmarks.co.uk/learning-to-count/ladybird-spots</p> <p>Which numbers do you recognise? Try to match the numbered leaves with the correct ladybird.</p> <p>Do you have to count the spots or can you subitize- know without counting?</p>	<p>Read a story about a bumble bee if you have one or watch the video of me reading 'Willbee the Bumblebee' on Tapestry.</p> 	<p>Bees help our fruit and vegetables grow by spreading pollen. Enjoy the bee's hard work by making a delicious fruit cocktail.</p> <p>Help peel and chop the fruit with a grown up. What is your favourite fruit? Do a house vote, which fruit has more votes?</p>  <p>Try to include a piece of fruit that you haven't had before.</p>	<p>This week, some of our activities are based around busy, bumble, bees. Search your house for objects which start with the initial sound 'b'. I wonder what you will find.</p> <p>Have a go at writing the sound b, you can use a pen/pencil chalk, paint, water.</p> <p>(optional sheet included)</p>
<p>As the weather is warming up now is a perfect chance to practise taking jumpers and cardigans off. Can you do this on your own? Can you turn it the right way round so you can put it back on?</p> 	<p>Use the number picture and question prompts to discuss the number 6.</p> 	<p>Practise your cutting skills Carefully cut around the 2D shapes, use the shapes to make your own bumble bee. What shapes have you used?</p> 	<p><u>Busy Bees counting song.</u> Learn the new song about bees (sang in the tune of 1,2,3,4,5 once I caught a fish alive) Try thinking of actions to help learn the song.</p>
<p>Listen and join in with the freeze dance party song. Remember to stand still when they say freeze! https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=2UcZWXvgMZE</p> <p>Try playing musical statues using your favourite songs. Who will be the best statue in your house?</p>	<p>Bumble bee craft Make a bumble bee, its up to you how you do it. You could:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Print bumble bees using potatoes and paint - Paint a bumble bee rock - Make a bumble bee paper mâché from a balloon 	<p>Using 6 bumble bees (or objects), explore separating them into 2 groups in different ways.</p> <p>Check understanding that even when the bees position changes, the total quantity is the same.</p> <p>*Challenge* Can you see what two numbers when added together make 6?</p> 	<p><u>Creepy Crawly Collage.</u> Use natural objects to make a minibeast collage. Collect flower petals, leaves, sticks and feathers. You can make your creepy crawly on the woodland floor or stick your items onto a piece of card. Remember to take a picture to put onto Tapestry!</p>
